Reading in school

- In Year I, we will listen to every child read each week.
- Later in the year, the children will begin to take part in paired reading where they will read aloud to a partner and listen to a partner read to them.
- Your child's books will change based on the phonics
 level that they are working at. We will be looking to see
 if your child knows the sounds within the book, are
 able to read each page fluently and also have a good
 understanding of what they have read.





Writing in school

opportunities to develop their ideas through drama, role play and visitors to the school.












Writing in school

- We follow Kinetic Letters as our handwriting scheme.
- Children have previously learnt many of the letter and number formations in Year R and we will continue to build on their previous learning. We will be sending Kinetic Letter handwriting packs home so that you are able to practise this learning further with your child. We will send each family home as and when we learn them, so please look out for these in your child's book bag.
- In addition, we have videos available on our Harrison YouTube channel which show Mr Cain, Mrs Todd and Miss Weld (members of the Harrison Team) demonstrating how to write the letters



Maths in school

- We follow the White Rose Maths scheme and will begin by ensuring children are confident with the skills from the Early Years Foundation Stage.
- We use lots of resources to help with our learning such as dienes, tens frames and numicon.





Foundation Curriculum

• We will continue to teach children a range of subjects at school. Our year group newsletter will detail the topics that we cover each term.

 Lots of our foundation curriculum learning will take place in outside areas so please ensure that your child has appropriate clothing depending on the weather.

 We will still have visits and visitors to the school to inspire children's learning and deepen their knowledge.

Phonics

- We continue to follow the Essential Letters and Sounds scheme that the children have started in Reception.
- We will be revising phase 2 and phase 3 before learning phase 5 which includes alternative pronunciations.
- Sessions are taught everyday for 30 minutes.












Yl Phonics Screening Check

- In June 2023 the national check will take place in schools across the country for all children age 5/6.
- The Phonics Screen Check assesses your child's ability to decode against age related expectations.
- They will be expected to apply their phonics knowledge to real and nonsense words.
- The checks will be administered on a 1:1 basis with an adult that the children are familiar with.
- The child will be required to read 40 words which they can sound out. The pass mark last year was 32/40.



Reading at home

- We want to make sure that every child in Year I becomes a fluent, confident reader. In order to do this, they must have excellent knowledge of letter sounds; how to name, say, blend and write these. Please ask your child questions about what they have read to check their understanding. Class teachers can provide examples if you are unsure what to ask.
- You can help by reading a range of texts with your child at least four times each week.

Please record when you read with your child in their reading diary.



Your child will be awarded a yellow responsibility merit point weekly for having at least four reads recorded in their reading diaries.





Where can I get more books?





You will find your child's username and password to continue using Oxford Owl in the front of their yellow reading diary. Once you have logged in, your child will be able to access books that are appropriate to their reading level.

Each week, an e-book will be set on Oxford Owls for your child to read either with an adult or on their own. This is linked to our Phonics learning in school each week. It is vital your child takes part in reading these.

Where can I get more books?

Your child can also explore a range of books on Oxford Owls using their class username and password. These books can be read for pleasure with an adult or independently. A range of fiction and non-fiction books are available to enjoy.

Attendance

Regular altendance and punctuality are vital for good progress and we expect all children's altendance to be 97%.

Attendance is shown as a percentage figure and we have detailed research below that shows how attendance, even at this early stage of education, affects outcomes for children at GCSE. We hope the tables below illustrate for you the importance of good attendance; this includes avoiding taking holidays during term time.

If your child had less than 97% attendance, we would urge you to ensure their attendance improves

this year.
